Harriers didn't realise that the long haul era was coming when one evening early in 2000 two young men met Pete Burns on the car park of the MRI and asked if they could run with the Harriers. They were Deon Vlok and Eduardo DaSilva two South African dentists. The duly joined the Harriers and with Mike Nugent, another South African member, and all we heard for the next few months were the tales of The Comrades Marathon (56 miles) and The Two Oceans Marathon (35 miles) in South Africa.

It was then suggested that maybe the Harriers ought to take part in one of these 'real' marathons. Deon and Mike sorted out accommodation in Capetown and Pete sorted out the flights and the trip to the Two Oceans Marathon was conceived. The trip cost the princely sum of £700 for two weeks in an hotel right by the Victoria and Albert Waterfront in Capetown. Bargain.

Thirty-Four Harriers, family and friends jetted off for Easter 2002. It is advertised as the world's most beautiful marathon and we couldn't argue with that, but 35 miles was something of a challenge in the heat for those that ran the full marathon.

This time 24 Harriers went off to Colombo in October for the Marathon and Half Marathon. Capetown had been hot; Vancouver wet; Colombo was hot and wet. The memorable moment on this holiday was the first night in Sri Lanka had a full moon. They do not serve alcohol in Sri Lanka when there is a full moon. A Harriers first night on holiday with no alcohol, well that was a first.
